Australian Greg Matthews styles Martin Crowe's new locks

FORMER New Zealand cricket captain-turned commentator Martin Crowe has joined former Australian cricketer Greg Matthews as a hair ambassador.

Matthews has been promoting baldness treatments since he had strand-by-strand hair replacement in 1993.

According to Advanced Hair Studio's publicity, the treatment takes second skin membrane combined with hair and integrates and blends it with a person's hair and scalp.
